Topic one: How lay members can help to create an environment that actively encourages **Replacement.** There are several AWERB tasks relating to this; advising on the **application of the 3Rs**, keeping staff informed of relevant **technical and scientific developments**; **retrospective review**; and supporting named persons and other staff dealing with animals on animal welfare, ethical issues and **provision of appropriate training** - in addition to consideration of replacement during **project licence application review**.

10.40-10.55	AWERB tasks relating to Replacement Although Replacement features in several AWERB tasks (see above), in practice in some establishments it may only be addressed during the review of project licence applications. It can be more productive to pursue the topic through the other relevant tasks, looking to create a culture that actively encourages and supports Replacement. Lay members can have an important role in driving such activities

Gene editing technology has been used in the laboratory for decades, but it is increasingly being applied (or proposed) for farm, wild and companion animals. There is considerable debate around the ethical and animal welfare implications, including whether it is fundamentally different from other ways of modifying animals and which purposes are - and are not - acceptable
